Proposal to Restructure the University Honors Program

For Consideration by the Arts & Sciences College Assembly 11/18/05

(approved unanimously by the University Honors Advisory Board; previously considered by the Common Curriculum Committee and the A&S Council of Chairs)

The University Honors Program should be restructured to include one Honors course in each of the following eight areas:

Behavioral/social sciences, English, fine arts, history, mathematics, natural sciences, philosophy, and religious studies.

In addition, the full Honors Program will include a requirement for an original, independent senior project. An **orientation course** to assist students as they prepare to undertake this project will be required for **one credit** P/F in the semester preceding the actual execution of the **senior project**. The project itself will count for **two credit hours** with a letter grade. Each student would declare her or his intention to pursue a senior project at the end of the sophomore year.


Therefore, this proposal would reduce the total required credit hours for the University Honors Program to 27.

NOTE: These are the minimum requirements. Honors students could elect to take more Honors courses to fulfill the rest of their Common Curriculum requirements.

EXPECTED BENEFITS

These changes would

- allow music majors, science majors, and transfers to complete the UHP
- allow departments to revise their UHP course offerings if they choose to do so
- allow exciting new interdisciplinary courses to be developed and offered
- remove or substantially reduce the AP penalty in English and history
- allow smaller sections of freshmen English and history courses to be offered
- enable consistent UHP requirements to be applied across colleges
- significantly reduce the reliance on contracted courses
- enable more Honors students to use their senior projects to apply for prestigious fellowships
- probably increase participation in the UHP by eligible students
- probably increase retention in the program (about 50% from 1st to 4th year)
- make our program more consistent with, and more competitive with, the vast majority of "distribution requirement" honors programs nationwide
- promote more flexibility with greater choice and more options for our highly talented, highly motivated students
