He holds a doctorate from Georgia Tech and currently teaches in both the History Department and the Environment Program at Loyola University. He has authored works for *Technology and Culture*, the *Journal of Urban History*, and the American Planners Association Press. His current book project, "Atlanta's Water Wars: Technocracy, Racial Politics, and Environmental Activism, 1945-2005" (under contract with University of Pittsburgh Press) examines the constraints that American cities faced while attempting to manage their environmental resources since the Second World War.
