



Finding Criminal Justice Articles

The Loyola library has access to several electronic indexes that will help you find journal articles in the field of criminal justice.

- **Expanded Academic Index** covers articles from many disciplines, including criminal justice and sociology, and includes some full-text.
- **Criminal Justice Periodicals** covers articles from scholarly and non-scholarly criminal justice-related journals, and includes some full-text
- **Criminal Justice Abstracts** provides comprehensive coverage of the major journals in criminology and related disciplines, extensive coverage of books, and unparalleled access to reports from government and nongovernmental agencies. There is NO full-text.
- **Sociological Abstracts** indexes the international literature in sociology and related fields, including journal articles, books, book chapters, dissertations and conference papers. There is NO full-text.

InfoTrac's Expanded Academic Index

This multi-disciplinary database won't give you ALL of the articles written on criminal justice topics, but it's a good place to start because it covers a some scholarly journals in just about every field. It sometimes give you the full text of the article, saving you a trip to the library to photocopy the item.

- Point your web browser to <http://library.loyno.edu>
- Click on DATABASES BY TITLE, scroll down, and click on EXPANDED ACADEMIC ASAP
- When you see the Expanded Academic search page, click in the white box, type your search statement and click "SEARCH."
- The full-text of articles are available if you see the words "text" or "# full pages pdf" accompanying the citation. (PDF indicates the full-image of the article.)

Expanded Academic Search Hints

- Click on the appropriate box to limit your results to refereed (scholarly) or full-text articles.
- Click on the "print or e-mail article" link before printing.
- If you can't get the full-text of the title from Expanded Academic, you'll need to go to the library's on line catalog to see if we subscribe to the journal.

Criminal Justice Periodicals Index

This database focuses on criminal justice topics. It provides the full-text of articles from about 50 important CJ journals, as well as indexing to another hundred or so publications.

- Point your web browser to <http://library.loyno.edu>
- Click on DATABASES BY TITLE, scroll down, and click on CRIMINAL JUSTICE PERIODICALS.

Criminal Justice Abstracts

Remember that Criminal Justice Abstracts does not give you the full-text of articles, and that it indexes lots of non-book material. Some of this non-book material can be VERY hard to get your hands on!

- Point your web browser to <http://library.loyno.edu>
- Click on DATABASES BY TITLE, scroll down, and click on CRIMINAL JUSTICE ABSTRACTS.

Sociological Abstracts is the granddaddy of all of these indexes. . it indexes journal articles, Ph.D. dissertations & even unpublished conference papers.
